



The 2023 Parliamentary Scorecard

The first Article of the Constitution recognizes your power as a Citizen of Kenya. According to the Constitution, sovereign power belongs to the people of Kenyan. All institutions and occupants of such institutions exercise power on behalf of the people: The President (and all cabinet), Members of Parliament among others.

The Constitution provides that we the people shall exercise our power directly or indirectly through elected representatives such as the Members of Parliament and County assembly, elected in a fair and transparent manner.



Role of a Member of Parliament

The first statement of the constitution recognizes your power as a Citizen of Kenya. According to the Constitution, Kenyans have power over the Constitution, the President (and all cabinet), Members of Parliament and all other institutions.

The Constitution provides that we the people shall exercise our power directly or through individuals such as the Members of Parliament and County assembly, elected in a fair and transparent manner.

Role of the National Assembly according to Article 95, Constitution of Kenya (Represent, Legislate & Oversight)

- The National Assembly represents the people of the constituencies and special interests in the National Assembly.
- 2. The National Assembly deliberates on and resolves issues of concern to the people.
- 3. The National Assembly enacts legislation.
- 4. The National Assembly determines the allocation of national revenue between the national government and county governments.
- 5. The National Assembly appropriates funds for expenditure by the national government and other national state organs.
- 6. The National Assembly exercises oversight over national revenue and its expenditure.
- 7. The National Assembly reviews conduct in the office of the President, the Deputy President and other State officers and initiates the process of removing them from office.
- 8. The National Assembly exercises oversight over state organs.
- 9. The National Assembly approves declarations of war and extensions of state of emergency.

Role of the Senate. (Article 96, Constitution of Kenya)

- 1. Represent the counties and protect the interests of the counties and their governments.
- Participating in the law-making function of Parliament by considering, debating and approving Bills concerning counties.
- Determining the allocation of national revenue among counties and exercising oversight over revenue allocated to the county governments.
- 4. As part of their oversight role, the Senate considers and determines any resolution to remove the President and the Deputy President from office.

The Scope of the Scorecard

The 2023 scorecard analyses the contributions of members and the legislative outputs of the 13th Parliament since being sworn in on 8th September 2022. Key things to note:

- 1. Mzalendo acknowledges participation in Parliament is just one of several parameters that can be used to judge performance.
- The Scorecard recognises the official role played by the leaders of Majority and Minority, whips, members of the Speaker's Panel and House Committee chairs and does not include their data in the report.
- This data uses a simple quantitative metric



Ruling on the Leadership of the National Assembly in the 13th Parliament: Majority and Minority Parties in the House (6th October

2022). Following a question that had arisen on the manner of constituting the House Business Committee, especially with regard to the membership reserved for the leaders and whips of the majority party and the minority party, the Speaker of the National Assembly made a Ruling on 6th October 2022 noting that the membership of the Kenya Kwanza Coalition stood at 179 Members while the membership of the Azimio la Umoja-One Kenya Coalition Party stood at 157 Members, as the 14 Members elected under the UDM, PAA, MCCP and MDG parties had expressly distanced themselves from Azimio. This, by implication, indicated that the Kenya Kwanza Coalition was the Majority Party and the Azimio la Umoja-One Kenya Coalition Party was the Minority Party in the House.

Ruling by speaker on the fate of Hon. Sabina Chege's position as Deputy Minority Whip and penalties meted; A fistfight ensued in the National Assembly, after the ruling by Speaker Moses Wetangula, retaining nominated MP, Hon. Sabina Chege as the Deputy Minority whip. This saw some members suspended from the House, leading to them missing out on the crucial voting of the Finance Bill, 2023.

Changes in the minority leadership and committee formations; Azimio went ahead to remove its rebel MPs from committees

move its rebel MPs from committees and replace them with loyal members, a move that Speaker Moses Wetangula stopped. Vetting of government appointees.

The new administration forwarded a number of names for vetting for key government offices and organs e.g the Cabinet, independent commissions. The responsible National Assembly committees have so far approved the appointment of all the nominees despite some having glaring leadership and integrity issues.

Senators voting down the Division of Revenue Bill; The Bill had proposed to increase the revenue share to counties from kshs. 385 billion to kshs. 407 billion, that had been proposed by the treasury and approved by the National Assembly.


The Highs

Strengthening and recognition of Parliamentary caucuses and secondment of their staff.

Bills that lapsed with end of the 12th Parliament were saved and pushed forwarded to this new Parliament for consideration through amendment of Standing Orders.

Strengthening oversight.

The proposed Powers and Privileges Bill 2023 seeks to provide a structured mechanism through which Parliament is able to receive reports from public officers on the resolutions passed by Parliament. This will ensure feedback on Parliament's resolutions. This acts as an oversight on the Executive.



Business Considered By The 13th Parliament

The National Assembly A. BILLS

35 Bills were considered in the National Assembly during this period with 29 of them originating from the National Assembly and only one from the Senate I.e. **The County Governments Additional Allocations (No.2) Bill, 2022 (Sen. Bill No. 4 of 2022)**

Bills Passed

1. The Finance Bill, 2023

The Bill (now an Act) sought to amend the laws relating to various taxes and duties to expand the tax base and raise revenue for the 2023/2024 budget that stands at KES 3.6 trillion. The controversial Bill sailed through the second reading after 176 members voted in support of it while 81 opposed it. During the Committee of the Whole stage, 184 MPs voted to approve the increase in fuel tax from 8% to 16% while 88 members voted against it.

2. County Governments' Additional Allocation Bill, 2022

Sponsored by Senator Ali Ibrahim Roba, the Bill sought to provide a legal framework for additional revenue to County Governments after outcry from Governors across the country that projects were stalling due to lack of funds. The additional funds were to come from loans, grants and national government revenue share which meant the release of KES 43.82 billion to Counties.

3. The Independent Electoral and Boundaries Commission (Amendment) Bill, 2022

The Bill alters the composition of the Selection Panel that oversees the filling of vacant positions in the IEBC. The Bill proposed a reduction of numbers allocated to the Parliamentary Service Commission in the selection panel from four to two. Furthermore, the Political Parties Liaison Committee, the Law Society of Kenya and the Public Service Commission are to nominate one member to the panel.

4. The Division of Revenue Bill, 2023

The Bill provided a legal framework for the equitable division of revenue raised nationally, between the National government and the County governments. The County equitable share consequently increased by KES 15.4 billion.

5. The Supplementary Appropriation Bill, 2023

The Bill provided a legal framework for the issuance of an estimate KES 200.5 billion out of the Consolidated Fund for service delivery.

6. The Appropriation Bill, 2023

The Bill sought to authorize the issuance of a sum of money out of the Consolidated Fund and its application towards the service of the year ending 30th June 2024 and to appropriate that sum and a sum voted on account by the National Assembly for certain public services and purposes.


7. The County Allocation of Revenue Bill, 2023

The Bill sought to provide for the equitable allocation of revenue raised nationally among the county governments for the 2023/2024 financial year and

the responsibilities of the national and county governments pursuant to such allocations.

8. The Supplementary Appropriation Bill, 2023

The Bill sought to authorize the issue of certain sums of money out of the Consolidated Fund and their application towards the service of the year ending on the 30th June, 2023, and to appropriate those funds for certain public services and purposes.





The Bill had proposed a reduction of numbers allocated to the Parliamentary Service Commission in the selection panel from four to two. Furthermore, the Political Parties Liaison Committee, the Law Society of Kenya and the Public Service Commission are to nominate one member to the panel.

3. The Division of Revenue Bill, 2023

The Bill provides a legal framework for the equitable division of revenue raised nationally, between the National government and the County governments. The County equitable share consequently increased by KES 15.4 billion.
